






Navigating Medicare

Medicare is Australia's universal health scheme which guarantees all citizens (and some overseas visitors) access to a wide range of health services at little or no cost. The Medicare Benefits Schedule (MBS) is a listing of Medicare services subsidised by the Australian Government. Currently, the MBS contains more than 5700 items. It is essential that GP supervisors orientate their GP registrars to appropriate use of the MBS, especially commonly used item numbers and pitfalls.

TEACHING TIPS AND TRAPS 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Exclusions for GPMPs e.g. obesity, hypertension, substance abuse • Medicare rules around chronic disease management items e.g. only one specialist can be counted towards the minimum of two multidisciplinary team members • Recommended frequency and minimum claiming times for GPMPs/TCAs, MHCPs etc. • Registrars may 'undersell' themselves and fail to bill appropriately - it is important to value the service provided despite relative inexperience • All providers are responsible for the accuracy of their billing, and daily billing tallies should be routinely checked

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MBS in practice

Scenario 1

Jan is a 55-year-old teacher with well controlled type 2 diabetes. She has recently returned home after a ski trip to Japan and tells you that she twisted her knee on the final day of skiing. She requests referral to the local physio for treatment as part of her existing care plan. How should this be billed?

Scenario 2

Maurice, a 33-year-old bus driver, presents to you with low mood. Three weeks ago his wife revealed that she had been having an affair and moved out. He feels 'devastated' and has missed several days work. You consider a MHCP and referral to a psychologist. How should this be billed?

Scenario 3

You are asked to see Harold, aged 81, who is in with the practice nurse for removal of sutures. Ten days previously, he had excision of a large BCC from his scalp by a plastic surgeon. How should this be billed?
