
### Scenario 5:

### Scenario 8:



## Scenario 10:

He has been diagnosed with psychosis and borderline personality disorder. Thomas presents to you with a painful right ankle after being injured last night and taken to the local hospital by the police.





#### Scenario 11:

Lucy is an intravenous drug user who has come from interstate with her boyfriend to avoid arrest. She has confirmed hepatitis C and has come to your practice with a urinary tract infection.



### Scenario 12:

Louise is a 40 year old mother of two who is a dependent drug user. As part of her treatment plan you have suggested that she go on a methadone programme. She is unsure as to whether it will help her addiction.
